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Summary

Space-time flexibility – referring to the extent to which people can freely choose when and where to participate in activities – is a core concept in time geography. Improving space-time flexibility of daily activities is expected to promote quality of life and sustainable transportation. Drawing on time geography, this dissertation explores the potential influences of the built environment on the space-time flexibility of shopping activities, as well as the possible transformations induced by the application of information and communication technologies (ICTs). The results highlight the significant roles of the built environment in shaping the space-time flexibility of shopping activities and the complex implications arising from the proliferation of ICTs. The findings contribute to advancing our knowledge and understanding of the challenges and opportunities brought about by ICTs for the development of sustainable cities and society.

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Rui Shao is a doctoral researcher at the Department of Geography of Ghent University. She received her bachelor's degree in Human Geography from Lanzhou University (China) and her master's degree in Geography from Beijing Normal University (China). In 2018, she started her Ph.D. program at the Social and Economic Geography Research Group.
